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#### What's New in the Medical World

Genetic counseling for hereditary Breast and Ovarian Cancer for those women at high risk is not often received. Researchers at Virginia Commonwealth University Massey Cancer Center have stated that only a small amount of women who qualify for BRCA1 and BRCA 2 genetic counseling actually receive the services. In addition, many women with a family history of Breast and/or Ovarian Cancer underestimate their own risk. Data was collected from 486 women over the course of two years. Of these women, 22 met the criteria for BRCA genetic testing. Yet, only 1 actually received genetic counseling and only 1 had reported prior genetic testing. In addition 27% of the women considered high-risk felt their actual risk for getting Breast or Ovarian Cancer was "low" and 32% of those at high-risk felt their actual risk was "lower than average." This is alarming information considering the fact that the BRCA1 and BRCA2 gene mutations account for 25% of <u>hereditary</u> Breast Cancers and most <u>hereditary</u> Ovarian Cancers. The United States Preventive Services Task Force says that primary care physicians should screen for hereditary cancer risk. John Quillin, PhD, MPH and lead study investigator says that too few women are following through with the BRCA counseling services, services that could ultimately save their lives. Quillin goes on to state, "We need to examine whether patients are fully aware of their family history, and if there are ways to optimize family history collection in clinical settings. This will help determine if educational interventions are needed for providers, patients or both."

#### **A Personal Message**

Every issue we feature a special message or personal story of someone who is affected by Ovarian Cancer either directly or indirectly. In this issue we highlight the story of Marcie Paul, an Ovarian Cancer Survivor.

The path leading to Marcie Paul's Ovarian Cancer diagnosis is, unfortunately, an all too familiar one for many women battling this disease. In 2009, Marcie noticed a mass in her abdomen. Because of its location in the middle portion of her abdomen and the fact that the mass would "come and go," Marcie assumed it was a gastrointestinal (GI) issue and consulted a GI doctor. Following some instances of intense abdominal pain, Marcie's internist eventually ordered a CT scan which confirmed the tumor. Not even Marcie's OB/GYN could clearly feel the mass even after being identified by the CT scan. It took five long months from the time she first noticed the mass until she had a definitive diagnosis of Stage IIIC Ovarian Cancer. She was just 51 years old at the time.

Marcie underwent debulking surgery (removing as much of the tumor as possible), 6 rounds of chemotherapy, plus a year of maintenance chemotherapy with Taxol. In addition, she also underwent genetic testing for the BRCA1 and BRCA2 mutated genes. As a Jewish woman, Marcie knew testing for the mutated genes was important as Ovarian Cancer risk is increased in women of Ashkenazi Jewish descent. Testing positive for either of these genes puts a woman at up to 87% greater risk for Breast Cancer and 44% greater risk for Ovarian Cancer. To put these statistics into perspective, the general population's risk of Breast and Ovarian Cancers is 12% and 1%, respectively. Fortunately, Marcie tested negative for both the BRCA1 and BRCA 2 gene mutations.

Since Marcie's diagnosis, she has committed herself to being an advocate for Ovarian Cancer in order to create more awareness and increase research funding. Marcie has stated that she could not control *if* she had cancer but she could control *how* she had cancer. She discovered it was important to find a balance between forging ahead without letting cancer define her or prevent her from living fully, while still remaining open to the life-altering lessons of the experience. Primarily among them, she felt compelled to spend more time purposefully.

Marcie has taken the cancer fight beyond her personal battle and has become an Advocate Leader for the Ovarian

Cancer National Alliance (OCNA), a presenter in their Survivor Teaching Students Program, and a grant reviewer for the US Department of Defense's Ovarian Cancer Research Program. Because OCNA did not have a Partner Member in Michigan, she was also instrumental in building the Michigan Ovarian Cancer Alliance (MIOCA) as one in 2011. Marcie is also a patient mentor for the MD Anderson Network, the Jewish Family Service, and MIOCA's Survivorto-Survivor Support Network. She is often paired with newly-diagnosed women and stresses the importance of staying hopeful and being your own advocate as this will help to make you a more knowledgeable and proactive patient. Marcie often adds, with a bit of tongue-in-cheek, that the advocacy is actually one of the most self-serving things she does because her life depends on it. But beyond believing that as a survivor it's her responsibility to fight this disease on the larger scale, she's also found it empowering, fulfilling, and healing.

Marcie also has a wonderful husband, Stewart Shevin, and daughter, Shera, supporting her. Shera was just 12 years old when her mother was diagnosed. While Marcie was terrified she might grow up without a mother, she was nevertheless determined her daughter would somehow learn something positive from the life-threatening experience and how best to face adversity. Shera is now preparing to head off to college. Marcie feels her daughter has gained a level of maturity and social conscience that she might not otherwise have possessed so soon had it not been for the challenges her family faced in battling this disease. Shera's own strength and courage was manifested when she participated in a national fundraising walk in New York while her mom was still in treatment and has continued to be participatory throughout her mother's battle. It is obvious that Marcie has instilled some strong values in Shera, and has been a wonderful role model for her young daughter.

It has been 5 years since Marcie's diagnosis and today she is considered cancer-free. While grateful, she lives with the reality that it could change at any moment because nearly 75% of late-stage patients who survive Ovarian Cancer will relapse. But that will not stop Marcie from (1) continuing to fight the battle through advocacy & awareness, (2) giving another "teal sister" hope and encouragement, and (3) being a role model for not only her daughter but all of those women, men, and families who have been directly or indirectly affected by this terrible disease. We wish Marcie only the best as she continues on her life's journey.

#### **Did You Know?**

- One of the risks for Ovarian Cancer is being of Ashkenazi (European) Jewish descent.
- There are more than 30 different types of Ovarian Cancer which are classified according to the type of cell from which they start. Most tumors start from one of the three common cell types within the ovaries:
  - Surface Epithelium cells covering the lining of the ovaries; account for 85%-90% of all cancers of the ovaries
  - Germ Cells cells that are destined to form eggs; these malignancies occur most often in teenagers and women in their twenties
  - Stromal cells cells that release hormones and connect the different structures of the ovaries; this is a rare malignancy with 70% of these tumors presenting at Stage I.
- The cancers that most often affect women are Breast, Colorectal, Endometrial, Lung, Cervical, Skin, and <u>Ovarian</u> Cancers.
