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Seed Grant Update

Below is a thank you letter from Dr. Sophia George, the researcher from the University of Miami for whom we cofunded a seed grant supporting her research in early detection

"I am writing this letter to thank you and everyone involved in The Belinda Sue Fund organization and the donors for supporting my work. I am grateful and honored that I was selected as a grantee in the 2016-2017 cycle through the Foundation for Women's Cancer grant cycle. It was extremely important to receive the initial influx of funding for a new investigator like myself, who just established a laboratory to study fallopian tube epithelial cells from women with BRCA mutations and non-carriers.

As you may know, the fallopian tube is thought to be the site of origin of serous ovarian cancer. Since this discovery about 10 years ago, Scientists and Clinicians have begun to study different aspects of the biology of these cells.

Because of this grant and the unwavering support of the Chief of the Division of Gynecologic Oncology, Dr. Brian Slomovitz, at Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center in Miami, we have established a cohort of 100 fallopian tube epithelial cell lines cells. These tissues came from women with known high-risk mutations with not just BRCA1 and BRCA2, but RAD51D, PALB2 and Lynch Syndrome: genes known and suspected to

Did You Know?

- Ovarian Cancer is diagnosed annually in nearly a quarter of a million women globally, and is responsible for 140,000 deaths each year
- Diagnosis at an early stage vastly improves a woman's chance of survival
- Many women mistakenly believe a cervical smear test (or Pap test) will detect Ovarian Cancer
- Ovarian Cancer is often diagnosed in later stages because a woman may delay seeking help thinking that her symptoms are due to 'the time of the month,' 'menopause,' 'something I ate,' or confused with other common stomach and digestive complaints

increase a woman's risk to develop breast and/or ovarian cancer. The women who have consented to participate represent the racial and ethnic (including women from Latin America and the Caribbean, Europe and Asia) spectra of women burdened with developing this disease.

From our study, we have generated models of the earliest known genomic events to occur – precursor nonmalignant lesions in the fallopian tube. We have identified that a mutation in the p53 gene, a gene that normally prevents cells from proliferating, along with a BRCA mutation decreases a class of antioxidant genes. This class of antioxidant genes are important in protecting the cells' DNA from damage.

We plan on expanding this project to understand:

1) how these antioxidant genes and proteins are changed with these genetic mutations; 2) how the use of chemopreventative (diet or otherwise) measures can increase functionality of these antioxidant genes to improve DNA protection in women with BRCA mutations and 3) how tumor cells use these parts of the antioxidant programs to protect their own DNA from chemotherapy-induced damage resulting in disease recurrence.

I am committed to studying and investigating the biology of the fallopian tube, and to continue advocating and sharing knowledge to different stakeholders in my community, nationally and internationally about early detection and risk reduction strategies associated with ovarian cancer development."
